## Holly Patzer and Jeanne Geraci believe in Compassionate Criminal Justice

Holly Patzer is the Executive Director of Wisconsin Community Services, Inc. (WCS), the oldest and largest criminal justice nonprofit agency in Wisconsin. The agency provides an extensive array of re-entry and alternative to incarceration services for youth and adults in the juvenile and criminal justice systems in the areas of halfway houses, offender supervision and monitoring, education, intoxicated driver intervention, treatment courts, restorative justice, mental health/addiction,

and neighborhood violence prevention. Holly has 28 years' experience working in the criminal and juvenile justice systems of Milwaukee and



Waukesha Coun- Holly Patzer ties, including being an experienced mediator and facilitator of Victim Offender Dialogue. She has a B.S. degree in Criminal Justice from UW-Milwaukee and a Paralegal degree from Concordia University. In addition, she has a Professional Certificate in Non-profit Management from UW-Milwaukee School of Continuing Education and the Helen Bader Institute for Nonprofit Management.

Jeanne Geraci has served as the Benedict Center's executive director since August, 2011. Founded in 1974, The Benedict Center is an interfaith, nonprofit criminal justice agency work-

ing with victims, offenders and the community to achieve a system of justice that is fair and treats everyone with dignity and respect. The Benedict Center provides direct ser-

vice and advocacy to create a more just criminal justice system. Core programs include the Women's Harm Reduction Program and its street outreach arm, the Sisters' Project, which provides treatment, education and support alternatives to incarceration for women involved in the criminal justice system. By taking a public health approach to the underlying issues of past trauma, mental health and drug addiction, women can more effectively build healthier lives for themselves and their families. The Benedict Center especially advocates for changes in the criminal justice system that create more opportunities for effective treatment alternatives.

Jeanne Geraci has worked for over 15 years in the nonprofit sector with a focus on advocacy and community organizing. She graduated from the University of Wisconsin-Madison with a Bachelor of Arts in Political Science and Economics.

Jeanne made a list of the items given as care packages in The Benedict Center's street outreach and to women in their program, which appears on the back page.

### Spinach Balls

Featured at the February Social by **Michelle Prosek**And requested by Members

#### **Ingredients**

- •3/4 C butter (1.5 sticks)
- •6 large eggs, beaten
- I box (6 oz) Chicken flavored stuffing
- •2 pkgs (10 oz each) frozen chopped spinach – drained and squeezed
- I C grated Parmesan Cheese
- •1/4 Tsp black pepper
- •Cayenne pepper or Hot sauce (optional)

#### **Instructions**

Preheat oven to 350 if you will cook immediately. 12-15 minutes to cook, until the bottoms are brown.

Melt the butter in a bowl, add the beaten eggs and Parmesan cheese and mix until smooth. Add Stuffing and spinach until well mixed. Season with pepper. Roll into small 1-2 inch balls, place on ungreased cookie sheet. You can also freeze these at this point, and pull them out a few at a time.
