Lavinia, by Madison playwright Betty Diamond, explores what it took for Janesville resident Lavinia Goodell to overcome gender barriers and to open the opportunity of the legal profession to all future generations of Wisconsin women. Working with a key group of supporters, including the Speaker of the Assembly, Goodell helped prompt introduction of legislation that prohibited gender-based discrimination in bar admissions. The legislation was signed into law on March 22, 1877, and Goodell's second application for admission to the bar was approved by the Supreme Court on April 22, 1879. Goodell died the following March at age 40, but her hard-won victory made it possible for women to be admitted to practice law before the Supreme Court.

Healing from Crime through Restorative Justice; the Victim's Perspective

Sunday, March 15, 2015

Location: First Congregational United Church of Christ; 54 S. Jackson St., Janesville, WI

Time: 6 pm

Janine Geske, former Wisconsin Supreme Court justice and retired law professor will talk about her work with Restorative Justice.

This presentation will describe the healing experiences of victims of violent crimes who are willing to meet face-to-face with their offenders and of victims who are willing to tell their stories to serious offenders in a maximum security prison. Restorative justice is a philosophical set of values used to address the ripple effects of crime on victims, their families, their communities, as well as the family members of the offender. The various uses of restorative justice from addressing bullying in schools to truth and reconciliation commissions will be discussed.

The program will be at 6 PM at the Janesville First Congregational United Church of Christ, 54 S. Jackson St. Enter through the door on the High Street side of the church. The program will be co-sponsored by Rock Valley Fellowship of Reconciliation and the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Rock County which holds services on Sunday evenings at this site.
