(Enter at the main south door and the room is beyond the second set of doors and to the right, past the women's rest room.)











ELEANOR ROOSEVELT WALK



The morning session began with information from Ingried Rothe, co-president of League of Women Voters of Dane County. She talked about three current bills before the assembly: dismantling the Government Accountability Board, changing campaign finance law, and having electronic voter registration. 

Gloryland by Shelton Johnson

December 8, 2015 ----- Discussion Leader, Ruth Grauer

Born on Emancipation Day, 1863, to a sharecropping family of African and Indian blood, Elijah Yancy never lived as a slave, but his self-image as a free person is at war with his surroundings: Spartanburg, South Carolina, in the Reconstructed

South. Exiled for his own survival as a teenager, Elijah walks west to the Nebraska plains and, like other rootless young African-American men of that era, joins the U.S. Cavalry.



The trajectory of Elijah's army career parallels the nation's imperial adventures in the late nineteenth century: subduing Native Americans in the West and quelling rebellion in the Philippines. Haunted by the terrors endured by black Americans and by his part in persecuting other people of color, Elijah is sustained only by visions, memories, prayers, and his questing spirit—which ultimately finds a home when his troop is posted to guard the newly created Yosemite National Park in 1903. Here, living with little beyond mountain light, cold rivers, campfires, and stars, he becomes a man who owns himself completely, while knowing he's left pieces of himself scattered along his life's path like pebbles on a

creek bed. Elijah's narrative voice—poetic, rhythmically cadenced, ranging freely through time—makes this novel a literary meditation on finding a self and a spiritual home, while unveiling a little-known chapter of America's past..amazon.com

Women's Equality Day!

On August 26th, over 30 women came together to celebrate 95 years of achieving the right to vote. The event was co-hosted by the AAUW and YWCA. Participants were able to view a timeline of women's milestones since 1920 and an exhibit focusing on the gender pay gap. Rita Pachal set up an information area for participants to learn the new voting laws in Wisconsin. She also passed around a petition advocating for legislative support focusing on several issues that are consistent with the AAUW and YWCA's mission of empowering women. Amanda Bergman spoke about the YWCA and participants were invited to tour the new Infant/Toddler center. Nancy Schulz presented on the history of AAUW and told of the many ways that AAUW impacts women through advocacy, research, education, and philanthropy. Connie O'Heron wrapped up the event by sharing some amusing stories surrounding the suffrage movement. A big thank you goes out to the planning committee: Ruth Hawks, Connie O'Heron, Rita Pachal, Marian Seagren-Hall, and Sande Sliwicki; Also, to Cate Bard and Kelly O'Heron for helping with the displays; and finally, to those who brought hors d'oeuvres and refreshments to share.

FOOTNOTE: Three weeks after this event I had the opportunity to visit Seneca Falls, NY and tour the National Women's Rights Museum. It all came alive as I read the writings of such strong and courageous women, such as Elizabeth Cady Staton, Lucretia Mott, and Susan B. Anthony. There are sculptures of these women and placed strategically around the town. It's hard to believe that it took over 70 years from the day of that first Women's Rights Convention before the right to vote was finally achieved. The women who began to movement had passed away by then. Cady Staton must have foreseen this as she wrote, "I never forget that we are sowing winter wheat which the coming of spring will see sprout and other hands than ours will reap and enjoy." It made me think of the work the AAUW does today in an effort to benefit the women of tomorrow. by Connie O'Heron, Ph.D.
