

### 3 EASY THINGS TO DO FOR THE MIDTERM ELECTIONS FROM DAWN OLSON, Public Policy Chair

AAUW and the AAUW Action Fund are committed to registering voters for the critical midterm elections – a time when young women in particular are less likely to vote even though the stakes are just as high.

#### Here are three easy things you can do:

- Check your power your voting power, that is! You are most likely already registered to vote, but it doesn't hurt to make sure your voter registration is current. Maybe you moved recently, changed your name, or haven't voted in a few years. Visit AAUW coalition partner <u>canivote.org</u> to check your registration in advance so you're not surprised when you show up to the polls.
- 2. Encourage your friends, family, co-workers, and neighbors to register to vote. Registering to vote just got easier, thanks to the <u>AAUW Action Fund online voter</u> registration tool. We need your help getting others registered to vote through this tool. There are important races all over the country in 2014, and the candidates on the ballot will have a huge say on issues such as equal pay, college affordability, jobs and the minimum wage, violence against women, access to birth control and other health care issues, voting rights, and more. <u>Send a message to your network</u> urging them to register to vote or update their registration today!
- Tweet up a storm! To start, make sure you are following us on Twitter @AAUW, @AAUWActionFund, and @AAUWPolicy. We'll be posting all sorts of content throughout the day, so retweet your favorites! ### From AAUW Inside Washington September 19, 2014 Bits and Pieces, submitted by Dawn Olson

- **On Tuesday**, the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau <u>sued</u> Corinthian Colleges for more than \$500 million for allegedly misleading students to take on private loans and collecting debt illegally.

- The Social Security Agency will <u>renew</u> its mailing of Social Security Statements, which provide benefits and earnings information. These mailed statements will be sent every five years to workers who have not already created a <u>my Social Security online account</u>.

- The Department of Labor <u>opened</u> the comment period for regulations to implement the antiretaliation executive order signed by President Obama in April.

- The <u>Senate</u> and <u>House</u> reached an agreement to reauthorize the Child Care and Development Block Grant program, which helps parents pay for child care while they work or attend school.

- Representatives John Kline (R-MN) and Todd Rokita (R-IN) <u>praised</u> the Senate Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions Committee for passing the Strengthening Education through Research Act and hope the Senate will approve it quickly. The bill seeks to improve and promote the federal education research system.

- In a recent AAUW blog post, we reflected on the <u>founding of the Eleanor Roosevelt Fund</u> <u>Award</u> 25 years ago. The award, which honors an individual, project, or organization that has made an outstanding contribution to equality and education for women and girls, is given every two years at Convention.

- On Thursday, Senators Cory Booker (D-NJ), Claire McCaskill (D-MO), and Jay Rockefeller (D-WV) <u>wrote</u> a letter to the heads of colleges in the five elite athletic conferences, requesting answers to 10 questions addressing a wide range of student athletic welfare, including health care coverage and tracking students' academic progress.

- A recent <u>report</u> by Purdue University and Lumina Foundation shows significant disparities in student loan debt between black and white college graduates. For example, 50 percent of black college graduates report more than \$25,000 in undergraduate debt, in contrast to 34 percent of white college graduates.

- Former Rep. Connie Morella (MD-08) <u>wrote</u> an op-ed describing the atmosphere and power of the Lindy Boggs Room, the first all-women space in the House of Representatives. Discussions in this room led to the creation of important legislation including the Violence Against Women Act and National Institutes of Health Revitalization Act.

In the spirit of "<u>Dia de la Raza</u>", Dr. Enrique E. Figueroa will discuss how Latinos and their demographic growth in the US are changing the paradigm of how we look at race & ethnicity in our country. Latinos in Wisconsin represent less than 1% of the total US Latino population, whereas California & Texas have nearly 50% of the entire US Latino population. Latinos represent nearly 50% of the total population of New Mexico and they represent nearly 40% of the total population of our largest state, California. Onein-four Latinos live in just 8-counties in the US. Therefore, Wisconsinites' view of Latinos in everyday life is quite different than in areas where Latinos represent a much larger share of the total population. Therefore, national views about Latinos are formed in areas outside of Wisconsin, though these national views affect Wisconsin.
