Efforts to increase our branch partnerships with local colleges and universities continue throughout Wisconsin. Jennifer Dillard is visiting several higher learning institutions during February and March to inform students of the benefits of an e-student affiliation AAUW membership, free for all partner undergraduates.

Many branches are working with their partners to design Equal Pay Day events for April 8. As you know, it takes women an extra three months to make up the 23% pay gap as women earn 77 cents for every dollar men earn.

You'll see an article in this issue about the Centennial Celebration of the Oshkosh branch. One thing to note is the remarkable scholarship connection between the AAUW Oshkosh branch and the University of Wisconsin, Oshkosh (UWO)). Over the past 40 years, the Oshkosh Branch of AAUW has funded \$35,000 in scholarships for women at both UWO and Fox Valley Technical College.

Looking ahead to our Wisconsin AAUW convention, we are planning a break-out session specific to C/U partnerships packed with ideas about how to get the partnership form signed and possible joint projects with C/U partners.

Five Steps for Branch Financial Health

Greetings. In the Fall 2013 Badger Brief issue are five steps A-E to Branch Financial Health. Below are five additional steps I learned at a workshop at the national convention in New Orleans.

Step F – Once a year review accounts before you develop a budget. Remove old/obsolete accounts and when appropriate add new accounts. On p. 12 in the *Branch and State Finance Tool Kit* is a list of typical accounts for both revenue and expenditures that a branch may use. *Branch and State Finance Tool Kit* is on the state web site, aauwwi.aauw.net, and national web site, www.aauw.org.

Step G – <u>Develop and use a budget</u>. Budgets are important for planning purposes. Chapter 2 in the *Branch and State Finance Tool Kit* describes the fundamentals of budgeting. The presenter in the workshop stated, "A budget is your friend."

Step H. – <u>Set up and maintain vendor and paid bills files</u>. Make sure to keep copies of invoices or receipts. Stamp or write paid. Record the account name and/or account number, check number and date paid on the invoice or on a reimbursement form.

Step $I - \underline{\text{Keep membership files up to date}}$. Check the branch member roster in the Membership Services Database two weeks after a branch check has cleared. The membership services database is located on the web site www.aauw.org in the Member Tools.

Step J – <u>Take advantage of connect@aauw.org when you have questions</u>. Experienced professionals with expert guidance are available to answer questions and help you.

I look forward to seeing everyone at the state convention in Eau Claire. It has been my pleasure to serve the state as Finance VP. My term will end June 30, 2014. Thanks to the branch finance officers and members who support and make AAUW an effective and passionate voice for women and girls.

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Oshkosh Celebrates Centennial

In February and March 1914, ten women gathered to form the Oshkosh Division of the Fox River Valley Branch of the Association of Collegiate Alumnae, which became a separate branch in 1915. Under the able leadership of Barbara Cook, the Oshkosh Branch Centennial Committee has organized a series of activities constituting a celebration that will make 100 years of history come alive.

Our first centennial project was to publish a new edition of the branch cookbook compiled for our 75th anniversary in 1989, updating it by adding new recipes contributed by current members. Sales of **Stirring Up Memories Again** have been brisk, but copies are still available at only \$15 each! Contact us via email at aauwosh-kosh@gmail.com.

A silent auction held at our Holiday luncheon in December raised enough money to fund our Centennial Giving Project, donating one \$100 check each month of 2014 to a different non-profit organization that actively supports the AAUW mission of advancing equity for women and girls. Beginning with the Boys and Girls Club of Oshkosh and the Winnebago County Literacy Council, we will be helping organizations that provide low income children with clothes (Take Five), books (Dolly Parton Imagination Library) and school arts programs (SOAR), in addition to seven other worthy causes.

At our January meeting, we toured the Morgan House, a lovely restored Queen Anne style mansion in downtown Oshkosh, across the street from the home where our founders met a hundred years ago. Using both our well-preserved branch records and 21st century tools like Ancestry.com, we researched the lives of our ten founders, and ten current members introduced them to us. We found that most of our founders were in their thirties or forties in 1914, and that 60% of them lived to be at least 88, with only one woman dying before age 60, clearly disproving misogynist claims that education was bad for women's health. Half of our founders were associated with the Oshkosh Normal School, as either faculty or graduates, previewing a consistent connection between the Oshkosh Branch and our Community/University partner and AAUW institutional member, known today as the University of Wisconsin Oshkosh.

That connection has grown stronger in recent years, as our University Liaison MaryBeth Petesch has forged ties with the UW Oshkosh Women's Center and its director, M. Geneva Murray, a certified AAUW *\$tart \$mart* facilitator and an Oshkosh branch member. Geneva obtained funding to hold an AAUW *Elect Her* workshop on February 15 that several branch

members will assist with, hoping to generate more female student leaders. Through that program, and with branch Centennial funds matched by UW-Oshkosh Chancellor Richard Wells, two UW-Oshkosh students will attend the AAUW National Conference for College Women Student



Leaders in June for the first time.

On March 4 from 6:00 p.m.-8:00 p.m. at the Reeve Union Theatre on the UW-Oshkosh campus, the Oshkosh Branch and the Women's Center are co-sponsoring "Suffrage in Sawdust City," a free performance depicting a fictionalized debate about tactics between Oshkosh's own prominent suffrage lobbyist Jessie Jack Hooper, portrayed by the author, and Doris Stevens of the National Woman's Party, a radical suffragist jailed for protesting for the vote, portrayed by Geneva Murray. Since the suffrage struggle was intense when our branch was founded, this seemed an especially appropriate Women's History event for our centennial year. The culminating event for 2014 will be our Centennial Celebration on Saturday, April 12 at 10:30am at the Oshkosh Country Club, 9.5 Be sure to send in your reservation by April 1.

Organizing this centennial has energized our branch, as many members have worked on our various celebratory activities. We have also raised our profile both on campus and in our communities, which we hope will attract new members and still more energy. We focused our meetings in this half of our centennial year on honoring our past; we will focus our Fall programming on issues that will propel us into our second century. We're ready for it!

Scholarships Awarded for National Conference for College Women Student Leaders

AAUW-Wisconsin offered two \$500 scholarships for Wisconsin women student leaders who would benefit from attending this prestigious national convention that encourages

women student leaders to be successful and gives them the skills to do so. There were a number of applications from around the state, and it was difficult to choose two women from among the highly talented nominees.

One of the winners is Elizabeth Richter, nominated by the Eau Claire Branch. She is a junior at the University of Wisconsin – Eau Claire, with a major in social work and a minor in Women's Studies. Since Elizabeth turned 18, she has been working as a living assistant for individuals residing in group homes. This fall she will be participating in an internship/field work program in Cape Town, South Africa where she will work with children there. Elizabeth is passionate

about her area of study as her goal is to strive for social justice and the needs of underrepresented populations specifically pregnant women, adoption agencies, and foster children. "We want to see women become all they can be, both in academia and in the workplace," Hoffman said.

Hoffman says Computer Science Education Week is observed each year in recognition of the birthday of computer science pioneer Admiral Grace Murray Hopper. Hoffman says Hopper received AAUW's Achievement Award in 1983.

"We want younger women, and particularly girls, to take an interest in computer science,' Hoffman said.

AAUW is a community of members who work to break through educational and economic barriers to give all women a fair

chance. Hoffman said research they have done shows why there are so few women in STEM fields.


"Girls get the message when they're about going into middle school grades, and they figure that they can't do it, that they shouldn't do it, that they're not smart enough," Hoffman said. "And a lot of them show an interest until they get to those ages and then they hear these messages and they shut down."


In a 2006 survey, 44 percent of girls and 38 percent of boys agreed with the statement, "the smartest girls in my school are not popular," and 17 percent of girls and 14 percent of boys thought that it was true that "teachers think it is not important for girls to be good at math."



Welcome to convention. Every two years AAUW-WI makes revisions to the Public Policy Statement. The proposed language changes are in *italics* below. These changes reflect changes in our political status. We hope that you will carefully read this issue list and do all you can to advance AAUW policies through advocacy. Thank you.







- Equitable and adequate funding to promote excellence and quality public education
- Rigorous state standards for entry into the teaching profession and recognition of a teaching license as the primary requirement for employment in public schools
- Education programs to address equity issues
- Opposition to diversions of public funds to non-public elementary and secondary schools, e.g. tuition tax credits, vouchers, etc.
- Comprehensive and medically accurate health and human sexuality programs, research-based science, the arts, humanities, multicultural studies and world languages in elementary and secondary schools
- Increased levels of participation for girls and young women in *science, technology, engineering and math (STEM)* in elementary and secondary schools
- Support for and access to higher education for women and disadvantaged populations
- 2. To achieve economic self-sufficiency for all women, AAUW-WI advocates
 - Pay equity and fairness in compensation
 - Affirmative action programs to improve racial, ethnic, and gender diversity
 - Programs that empower women by providing them with education, training, and support for success in the work force, including non-traditional occupations

- Vigorous enforcement of and full access to civil and constitutional rights, including voting rights
- Campaign finance reform that will promote equitable participation and representation
- Expansion of opportunities for women's participation at all levels of govern-
- Vigorous defense and expansion of civil and constitutional rights
- Preserving rights of individual choice in the determination of one's reproductive life
- Improved accessibility and affordability of quality mental and physical health
- Improved research and treatment of women's health across the life span.
- Support for programs that include adequate funding to prevent violence against women and to address the impact of violence against women.

- B. Salsa is an AAUW electronic distribution system used for the Two-Minute Activist and Action Alerts. Several Board members have been trained. Salsa sends out alerts and email blasts based on zip codes or a set radius of miles. We are trying to figure out how to make use of Salsa for the other communication applications.
- C. Kate wants branches to supply more content on the website with an emphasis on photos.
- C. Our Nov. 19 webinar on College/University partnerships is accessible on Google Drive
- D. We can use Facebook to post conference events, news content, branch or regional news, announcements of achievements, and list branch board members, etc.

Communications & Badger Briefs - Marlene Salley - report

Joyce reported for Marlene.

- A. All elected VPs must submit articles for the convention issue of Badger Briefs, due now.
- B. Kate Hinnant will edit the convention program book this year. April 1 is the deadline for material.
- C. Publicity for the convention: Connie Russell will coordinate an interview schedule for our AAUW-National keynote speaker, Catherine Hill, and news outlets in the Eau Claire area.
- D. Connie Russell suggested that we look into a PSA on Wisconsin Public Radio in the fall when branches are recruiting new members. Such an announcement may cost \$200, but would increase awareness of our organization.
- E. Last year, a postcard was designed, printed and sent to AAUW-National members (MALs). We may do it again this year.
- F. An electronic convention registration form can possibly be distributed through Salsa.

College/University Coordinator - Kathy McCarville

Kathy reported on events and activities at UW-Whitewater, including e-affiliate student registration.

- A. C/U webinar last fall had about 10 attendees. Need to schedule it again and target select people to invite.
- B. C/U representatives can work with branches to get the AAUW on campus, ads in college newspapers, equal pay notices on cafeteria tables, AAUW listed as event sponsor. Grantors look for community connections when considering awards. AAUW can be that community connection for C/U partners.
- C. *Start Smart*, created by WAGE Project, is a salary negotiation workshop for college women designed to reduce pay inequity. Facilitators are trained to conduct the workshops. Training is planned on April 25 at the UW-Eau Claire campus for up to 40 students and 20 facilitators. The cost is \$350 for all the students and a per-person fee of \$100 per facilitator trainee. Half of the \$100 fee is refunded after the facilitator conducts her first workshop.

Motion: Julie Ferris moved to spend \$2,000 to support *Start Smart* facilitator training for 20 AAUW members. Connie Polley seconded. Motion passed.

Finance - Janet Quail

Janet submitted her mid-year financial report and answered questions.

Girl RISING, a film about educating girls in developing countries, was acquired for viewing at convention.

Motion: Peggy Crane moved to affirm the expenditure of \$350 for the film. Julie Ferris seconded. Motion passed.

Public Policy - Barbara Peterson

Barbara reported via phone conference.

- A. Catherine Emmanuelle will be public policy chair in 2014-16.
- B. Barbara and Jennifer are slated to facilitate the breakout session, *It's My Vote* (GOTV) to strategize how to use the \$500 in grant funds available to branches to reach and register young women.
- C. Barbara will send an Action Alert for Common Cause regarding redistricting. Mike McCabe, Wisconsin Democracy Campaign, is an advocate for impartial redistricting.
- D. Revisions to the Public Policy Statement 2014-16 is being prepared for the convention booklet.
- E. Barbara is drafting a resolution on human trafficking. In Wisconsin, human trafficking for sex and labor mainly concerns 12 to 13 year-old runaways. Operations congregate along the I-94 corridor and in recreational areas. Wis. Dells is a mecca. A national convention on human trafficking will be held in Green Lake in May.
- F. Equal pay day is April 8. A call-in lobby day is being planned.

Bylaws - Stephanie Malaney

A. Stephanie reviewed revisions to AAUW-WI bylaws and answered questions.

Motion: Suzie Danielson moved to adopt mandatory changes and Stephanie's recommendations to publish the bylaws in the convention booklet. Julie Ferris seconded. Motion passed.

B. Stephanie reported that branches need to have language in their bylaws conform to AAUW-National mandates. She also strongly recommended that all branch bylaws be submitted for review to the state.

Nominations - Margot Bouchard - report

Joyce reported for Margot.

Margot submitted candidate Diane Lau, Sheboygan Branch, for the office of State Finance VP.

Margot submitted candidate Lynn Hildenbrand, Milwaukee Branch, for the office of State Funds Development VP.

Motion: Janet Quail moved to accept the nominations. Suzie Danielson seconded. Motion passed.

Historian - Nancy Schultz

Joyce reported for Nancy.

Hard copies of official documents, for example minutes, need to be submitted to Nancy for archiving.

Fund Development – Julie Ferris

Julie noted that the State must caution branches from creating centennial fellowships or other named funds now that many branches are reaching 100 years. Wisconsin has two open funds: Appleton Centennial Research and Projects Fund at \$14,230, and the Katherine Teska Research and Projects Fund at \$44.641. Both need to be completed.

Convention fundraising for Leadership Programs Fund (#4334) will be encouraged by providing giving envelopes. Julie is looking for people to match funds raised. For instance, when \$1,000 is raised, then someone matches the thousand. Julie also suggested that three branches supply attractive raffle baskets so she can sell raffle tickets as she did last year.

New fund: Racine Branch is in process of opening a Centennial Fellowship for \$200,000.

Membership – Joyce Gregg

Madison-Menona Branches have voted to merge. The paperwork has been signed.

Branch health report: Janet created a membership count for branches in the last three years.

Growth & Gumption Awards. Joyce noted that membership comparison from year to year does not measure members not renewed and new members recruited. Joyce will come up with awards for various ways branches have recruited new members and is looking at an award for retention, but it is difficult to measure changes.

Program - Frances Kavenik, Connie Russell

Connie reviewed the registration form and noted that meals cost \$58, but the committee is charging \$50 for meals and convention registration at \$50. She also noted that the hotel is not charging for the use of AV equipment.

2015 Dist. 2 convention. Joyce suggested that the State organize the convention in 2015 with help from branches in District 2. The Osthoff Resort near Elkart Lake was offered as a site.

2016 A joint convention with Illinois is being discussed. Need exploratory team.

Leadership – Donna Weidman

NCCWSL scholarship recipients. Donna noted that Wisconsin was not recognized as having a students at the NCCWSL event. She AAUW-National needs to properly record scholarships.

Strategic Plan Discussion of revised strategic plan. Donna answered questions.

Motion: Kathy McCarville moved to accept and publish in the convention booklet revised Strategic Plan. Stephanie Malaney seconded. Motion passed. Branch redistricting (esp. Dist. 5): The Board discussed moving Milwaukee Branch, currently in Dist. 3, into Dist. 2. Will take up this issue in district meetings at the convention. Julie will also discuss the possibility with the Milwaukee Branch board.
