Public Policy from AAUW Washington Update August 22, 2014:

Women's Equality Day was observed on August 26. It commemorates the day in 1920 when the 19th Amendment was officially added to the U.S. Constitution, recognizing and guaranteeing a woman's right to vote.

Women's Equality Day always takes on special significance for me in an election year, and 2014 is no different. Next week on Women's Equality Day, we will be exactly 10 weeks out from the election on Tuesday, November 4. Depending on where you live, you could be voting for your U.S. House representative, U.S. senator, governor, state legislators, or any number of <u>ballot initiatives</u> on AAUW priority issues. And if 2014 is anything like 2012, women's votes will make the difference.

To get in the Women's Equality Day spirit, you can also <u>read about AAUW members who were active</u> <u>suffragists</u> and join the nationwide <u>#WEmatter</u> conversation on social media to highlight the issues that impact women and families.

The past informs the present, and how we act today – and on Election Day on November 4 – will determine our future.


